"Stay awake! Stand firm in your faith! Be brave and be strong?" 1 Corinthians 16:13

Do you remember that old '60s TV show, 'Lost in Space?' If you do you will never forget 'The Robot's' constraint, "Warning, Warning Wil Robinson," which it shouted any time the crew of the Jupiter 2 was endangered, especially its youngest member, Wil.

WARNING WARNING ... STAY AWAKE!! Be alert!!! Those admonitions these days could be screamed out over and over again. It does not matter where we look in our world ... we see violence, hate, division, and challenges. Every time we focus in on the world's activities, including sometimes our own small circle of life, it seems that events are raising our collective blood pressure level and bringing out our worst feelings rather than our best.

Paul is writing to a challenging group of early Christians in Corinth. Like us, they too were facing challenges in their lives. Those challenges seemed to pull those people of faith, who probably knew someone who had actually seen or heard Jesus, to pull away from their faith for a variety of reasons. Paul declared STAY AWAKE! He reminded them to hold onto their faith by being brave and strong.

The words he wrote in that letter after telling these faithful people to be strong were, "EVERYTHING should be done in LOVE!" Quite the combination of themes, isn't it? Strength, love, and faith.

As we approach Christmas 2023, this year's Advent Season, and Thanksgiving ... I am full of so many mixed emotions... energized



thankfulness for my health, and concerns. What I have found is the constant I need, have needed, and will continue to hold onto with desperation, is my faith.

Yes, this is a year I have screamed at God, and also cowered before God in a hospital bed, not knowing ... just not knowing. Even with my faith I needed God to lift me up and embrace me. You know, to let me know it was all ok ... You might have heard me mention in a couple of recent sermons, 'How great thou art!'

I am writing this particular article as an alert to you ... not to your spouse nor your child. Not to your best friend nor the neighbor who gets everything right all the time. As your pastor, as a human being who was wondering about my own life's life span, and frankly as a person of faith, I am sending out this alert hoping that you will be investing time as we get close to Christmas ... with God. Your valuable time ... your minutes or perhaps even seconds, because none of us knows what direction this journey will take. One day we are here doing many things and the next ... well, let's just hope we all have many days.

This past summer when I urged, "assigned," and hoped that each of you would read the Twenty-Third Psalm 'once a week every week for the rest of your lives,' I knew few would. The truth is, I also know that if you made that investment ... suddenly you'd sense the need to find the still waters so that your soul could be restored. Friends, it is all about our relationship with God and whether one really exists. God is trying to provide a strong bond with us as individuals and also is hoping to direct us, because "The Lord keeps me alive. The Lord guides me in proper paths for the sake of the LORD's good name." That is the translation from the Common English Bible of Psalm 23 verse 3.



So my alert ... my warning ... my concern ... and my prayer and hope this Advent season is that each of you associated with St. Paul's United

Methodist Church understands that time is fleeting. God is ready to take us on but that is our decision to make. It does not require moving to a monastery nor giving up all of your TV binge watching pleasures ... just an understanding that the world is tugging at each of us just like it was doing to the Corinthians, leaving a clear choice to be made.

Are you brave enough? Strong enough? Do you sense your personal faith every day? Stay awake, friends, and seek out God's grassy meadows so that God's "goodness and faithful love will embrace you all the days of your life and you will live in the Lord's house forever!"

Able to Leap Children's Benches in a Single Bound

Ok, this is personal, and a confession of the pastor who is confessing to at least one and perhaps many of the shortcomings of the male of the species.

On Saturday October 14th of the year 2023 I was admitted to Inspira Medical Center with a blockage of the artery well known as "The Widow Maker." I thought I was having a sinus problem.

But men, this is not about my thinking I had a sinus condition and that I had no reason for going to either Urgent Care much less the Emergency Room. As I told the receptionist at my new GP's office, I confess to being a classic male who is 'stupid and stubborn' and at times considers himself to have 'Superman-like powers' that do not require intervention by anyone other than me.

And I will include my brother in this listing so that I have family company in my stubbornness, stupidity, and 'we could have died' experiences.

Neither of the Delaney boys ever went to the doctor. Nada ... no visits and yes, I know I am only 31 years old, but Mark is much older.



Yet neither of us had been to the doctor's office in literally a decade plus until we stepped into the ERs. And that was even with COVID's realities ... nope, no doctor's visit for either of us because we felt great, worked hard, and we both had endless energy!

Last summer when Mark had his AFib, he went to the Urgent Care because he was out of breath going up steps. No pain in his chest but he was frustrated and wanted a pill to take. He went directly to the ER where they told him that if he had not decided to stop by the Urgent Care he more than likely would not have lived two more weeks and would have never enjoyed his granddaughter.

In my case ... I was sure I had a sinus issue. I was tired of people telling me to see a doctor (I didn't have one) so on a rainy Saturday I drove to Washington Township for an appointment with Urgent Care. They were wonderful and caring, but the doctor said "which ER do you want to go to? Jefferson or Inspira?"

I didn't want an ER ... I didn't need an ER ... and then he asked me if I wanted him to call an ambulance. Wait, I am healthy ... my BP is top rate, I am energetic and able to leap children's benches in a single bound ... but I wasn't. My life was in danger ...

So today I am good. Mark is living a healthy life and is good. We both have doctors and we both have medicine to take the rest of our lives.

We also know if we had not gone into those Urgent Cares that our hearts were not going to carry us through without care.

We men are worse than women when it comes to taking care of ourselves. We don't go to the doctor. We put ourselves at risk, which means we put our families and friends at risk of losing us.

Not the wrapped packages under our trees, not a mythical rednosed reindeer leading other flying reindeer to every house in the world in the course of one night, not trying to get the best gifts of the year into the hands of family and friends ... but celebrating Jesus Christ, God's loving gift of a Savior for every human being.




If you have been in the parsonage, you will have noticed that my "Christmas" tree never goes away. And if you turned around from the Christmas tree you would see not one but two "crèche" scenes

featuring the characters from Charlie Brown's Christmas prominently displayed. The tree is my celebration of the season, but the manger scenes are an ongoing reminder of what Christmas and life are all about ... God's love, God's peace, and God's rescue.

This very difficult year is closing out soon. Thanksgiving will be different in our home ... Christmas will be difficult in our home, but the difference and difficulty does not lessen our connection to God's love. I have closed out other years and have always been aware that we are called to live and to be the light of that Christmas star to those we come in contact with.

And today, as October closes out and I write this article, I am sitting at my dining room table looking at my Christmas tree to my left and one of the Charlie Brown Christmas crèches



to my right, singing the John Lennon song, 'So This Is Christmas.' "So this is Christmas, and what have you done? Another year over and a new one just begun ... And so, this is Christmas ... the world is so wrong."

Yes, Lennon's words in the song caused me to stop because perhaps I have missed that phrase before. He also sings, "Let's stop all the fight" in this song first released in 1971. The song continues with a look ahead ... "And a happy New Year, let's hope it's a good one without any fear."

John (the one from the Bible, not the singer) writes, "There is no fear in love; perfect love casts out fear." A God message focused on our relationship with God.

And this year Christmas Eve is on a Sunday ... Wonder how many people will skip church in the morning to attend afternoon and evening services when Silent Night is featured? Wonder how many people will skip traditional Christmas Eve services by saying they went to church in the morning and two worship services are just too much for their family? Wonder how many churches will be emptier than in years past? Wonder how much fear and fight will be consuming all too many people rather than allowing God's love to take control of time, presence, and experience in worship?

All I can do is encourage and invite you to make worshiping God a priority this Christmas season. I can ask to consider whether your children will be more blessed through a bonus hour or two in church or by whatever is on the television screen on December 24th. It is your choice to make.

Another year approaches ... mystery abounds ... but without God's delivery of a child to a homeless couple in Bethlehem who soon would be illegal immigrants in Egypt, there would be no shiny wrapped presents under our trees. If we erased the history of the angels' call to the worn-down hardworking shepherds in the field that night ... shepherds who made their way to a barn stall to gaze upon the Son of God ... well, we'd not be rescued.

The birth of Jesus ... the delivery of God's loving gift ... should be what Christmas is all about for all of us. Time is fleeting, I know all too well. So is this the year Christmas regains its priority? The birth of a Savior, THAT IS WHAT CHRISTMAS IS ALL ABOUT ... Hoping to see you, some family members, and perhaps some of your friends in church with us on Christmas Eve 2023!

Did You Know?



DO YOU REMEMBER THE OYSTER SUPPERS AT ST. PAUL'S?

We used to have oyster and chicken salad dinners here at the church. I was a "waitress" for the oyster suppers here starting when I was a teenager. Lots of walking back and forth to the kitchen for platters of fried oysters. My mother, Erma Lentz, was one of the food planners, making sure that chicken, potatoes, and other things were purchased for the dinner. A group of the ladies made the salad dressing for the chicken salad. Bob Platt was one of the ticket takers, stamping tickets with a number, and calling the numbers for the next group of people to come downstairs to eat.

In 1990 our fryers were condemned by the Fire Inspector because of a lack of the required ventilation safety equipment in the kitchen. Since we were no longer able to fry the oysters here, we joined with the Thorofare Fire Company. We had joint suppers there twice a year for 27 years until the price of oysters became so high they were no longer profitable.

The first oyster supper at St. Paul's was in 1869, an oyster and terrapin dinner to earn the money to complete the original building. The last oyster supper we served was in 2017.
