# A "Heart-Felt" Thank You

"Now may the Lord of peace give you peace at all times in every way."

2 Thessalonians 3:16

And then Dave Fish stopped me as I was about to send the church family out into the world. He stopped me with a sense of love, faith, and peace. Our laity leader called all of you forward to touch me both physically and spiritually. Hands reached out ... my eyes closed as I knelt in the front of our beautiful church ... needing those prayers, those hands, and that love more than perhaps any of you knew on Sunday, April 21.

Yes, I was going to the hospital the next day for heart surgery, which no matter how minor I knew it would be, the thought of that surgery truthfully still had me worried. I was worried even though I have become friends with my surgeon and fully trust him. My heart was going to be physically touched by humans ... wires attached and what they call a generator inserted into my chest forever ... my forever, however long that might be. I couldn't help but think back to last May at a different hospital. I needed those prayers, hands, and hugs.

I could never have imagined these last 12 months. My emotional heart has been ripped apart in ways that go beyond any words, and it will frankly never fully recover. And then a few months after my loving heart was shredded, my physical heart was found to have defects that I could never imagine were there, because I always have had



high energy and never have been really sick. I go forward but I am not the same person I was last May first.

Do these realities mean that I have been distracted at times? Of course, because otherwise I would not be a human being. I have had some special people intervening and helping me get through these physical challenges and my emotional earthquakes since May. If you have felt neglected or ignored during this past year, I apologize and can only hope that you have the understanding in your heart to accept me as a pastor who loves all of you more than you can imagine, but also accept that I am a human like each of you with a long list of frailties; a pastor with emotional highs and lows, a pastor who also will slip and fall and make mistakes on an ongoing basis until that day when the newly inserted "generator" in my chest no longer is needed.

At the end of the day, as I type these words one day after the defibrillator was inserted into my chest, I need each of you to know that the verse that I included above reflects why I am able to go into my tomorrows with joy in my heart! God ... the God who

created the universe, the God who gave us Jesus, and is the God who loves each of us ... truly provides peace to each of us if we truly seek it. God does not focus on what's behind us, because otherwise we'd all be in trouble. God calls us forward as Paul reflected, "I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. One thing I do is to forget what is behind and strain ahead pressing on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus."

So a "heart-felt" thank you from a heart that now has two wires attached to a generator and two stents allowing the blood to flow freely. Thank you from me to each of you who was in church that Sunday and whose hands touched me directly or through those touching me. Another thank you for those who texted me throughout those days, checking on how I was doing. More than anything else, thank you for all the love we have felt since May of 2023 and for your understanding on how our lives have been impacted. It is through this church family that God has given me peace ... even in the toughest moments and saddest moments and challenging moments and moments of wondering what might happen. I am blessed and looking forward to getting back to full health in the not-too-distant future.

## Food Pantry News

Let's start the St. Paul's Food Pantry May update with a few spectacular statistics from 2023:

Throughout the year, **TWELVE VOLUNTEERS** represented the ministry of St. Paul's in our community outreach.

Thanks to the fundraising efforts of local organizations, our congregation and a generous farmer in the community, we gave out **TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS** in ShopRite gift cards.

We distributed **THIRTY-SIX THOUSAND POUNDS** of food. I'll let that number sink in - 36,000 pounds. That's 18 tons of food, or over 40,000 meals to the families we serve in our community.

The food we provide to our pantry clients comes from a variety of sources. As a participant in the Food Bank of South Jersey, we receive a monthly allotment of goods from the USDA, the State Food Purchase Program, and additional food donated



directly to the Food Bank for distribution to its pantries.

We also receive non-perishables from food drives organized by local groups and companies in our community and direct donations from our parishioners. Periodically, we need to purchase additional items for distribution, and your generous donations help cover those costs.

One additional source that we're very excited about is the Retail Rescue Program, where volunteers from our pantry go to local stores to pick up unsold goods. We've sourced donations in a similar

manner the past few years from Big Lots and ShopRite. We're looking to expand our participation with additional stores as we move forward in 2024. There will be more to come on Retail Rescue in our next update.

As I wrap up this month's update, I want to shout out a huge **THANK YOU** to the volunteers who are our boots-on-the-ground. The crew shows up with smiles to unload and put away pallets of food, to pack bags on a Tuesday before distribution, and even when they arrive early every second and fourth Wednesday morning to distribute the food. They are wonderful, and their hard work makes it possible to serve so many in the community.

I'm proud of our service to the community and grateful to everyone in the church family who has given his/her time, provided funding, and donated food.

## Did You Know? THE YEARLY SUNDAY SCHOOL YARD SALE HELD AT MCCARSON'S HOUSE

On a Saturday in June the church held its annual yard sale to benefit St. Paul's Sunday School at Ray and Edie's house located on Jessup Road. We'd all pray for good weather and except for a time or two of light sprinkles, the weather would usually be sunny.

The Friday night before the yard sale was always a busy one for the men of the church. Treasures that were stored in the church attic all year would be brought down (remember all those boxes of books) and they along with the heavy wooden tables from the fellowship hall, would be taken to the McCarson's house and stored on their front porch until morning.

Saturday morning would arrive and you'd find the Anchor Class setting up and manning the Sunday School tables. Tables cost five dollars to rent and there would be plenty of church members selling their own treasures. Of course, the Guiding Lights would sell food for the Sunday School. Ray would run electrical cords across the yard for us to plug in the coffee urn and the roaster for the hot dogs. Plenty of sodas and water on hand if you were hot and thirsty.

The yard sale ran from 8-1. All the treasures that weren't sold that day, were packed up and taken back to the church for the next year's sale.



It's been at least twenty years since the last Sunday School yard sale at the McCarson's was held, but the memories of them still remain.
